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# Theme of the Day LIVE LIKE YOU'LL LIVE FOREVER --LIVE A LIFE OF COURAGEOUS WITNESS

Jesus repeatedly told His followers that living as His disciples would bring hardship. Living life according to God's Law is going to make one appear odd in the eyes of the world, perhaps even evil. Sharing a message of mankind's sin and God's gracious salvation can cause offense. So why not just stay silent if that makes life easier? Why not keep our faith private? Answer: because we are going to live forever. In gratitude for Christ saving us and giving us eternal life, we share the gospel with others, hoping that they will believe and be saved too. Since we know we are going to live forever in the perfection of heaven, we don't worry if being a witness for Christ brings hardship or even death.

Martin Luther wanted to reform the false teaching of the church. He stood firm in the truth of the gospel, knowing it might cost him his life. But Luther knew that, thanks to Christ, he would live forever. So will we. Therefore, like Luther, let us live a life of courageous witness.

C: From depths of woe I cry to You; Lord, hear me, I implore You. Bend down Your gracious ear to me; My prayer let come before You. If You kept record of my sin And held against me what I've been, How could I stand before You?


P: Your love and grace alone avail To blot out my transgression. The best and holiest deeds must fail To break sin's dread oppression. Before You none can boasting stand, But all must fear Your strict demand And live alone by mercy.

C: Therefore my hope is in the Lord And not in my own merit; It rests upon His faithful Word To them of contrite spirit. That He is merciful and just--This is my comfort and my trust. His help I wait with patience.

P: God has promised His forgiveness of sins to those who repentantly confess their sins, imploring His grace and mercy for the sake of His beloved Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. In the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ, as His called and ordained servant, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

## <u>Reformation Sequence</u> Part 1

- P: One of the most famous documents of the Reformation Era is the set of the Ninety-Five Theses posted on the door of the Castle Church at Wittenberg, Germany, on October 31, 1517. In this set of ninety-five statements that Dr. Luther wished to have debated was a challenge to accepted practices in the church of his time that Luther felt were at odds with the biblical witness and therefore were not true. His introduction to the set of statements he had written is highlighted by two words: "love" and "truth." We now read what Luther wrote as the introduction to his now famous Ninety-Five Theses.
- C: "Out of love for the truth and the desire to bring it to light, the following propositions will be debated at Wittenberg, under presidency of the Reverend Father Martin Luther, Master of Arts and of Sacred Theology, and the Lecturer on Ordinary on the same at that place. For that reason, he requests that those who cannot be present and debate orally with us may do so by letter."
- P: The challenges to Luther that resulted from his posting of the Ninety-Five Theses remained a constant factor throughout his life. A few years before his death, he wrote the words to the stirring hymn "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word." Both the text and the tune are attributed to the great reformer and serve as our closing hymn today.

*First Lesson*: **Daniel 3:16-28** – In response to an evil command offered by a pagan king, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego lived lives of fearless witness.

- <sup>16</sup> Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego replied to him, "King Nebuchadnezzar, we do not need to defend ourselves before you in this matter. <sup>17</sup> If we are thrown into the blazing furnace, the God we serve is able to deliver us from it, and He will deliver us from Your Majesty's hand. <sup>18</sup> But even if He does not, we want you to know, Your Majesty, that we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up."
- <sup>19</sup> Then Nebuchadnezzar was furious with Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, and his attitude toward them changed. He ordered the furnace heated seven times hotter than usual <sup>20</sup> and commanded some of the strongest soldiers in his army to tie up Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego and throw them into the blazing furnace. <sup>21</sup> So these men, wearing their robes, trousers, turbans and other clothes, were bound and thrown into the blazing furnace. <sup>22</sup> The king's command was so urgent and the furnace so hot that the flames of the fire killed the soldiers who took up Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, <sup>23</sup> and these three men, firmly tied, fell into the blazing furnace.
- <sup>24</sup> Then King Nebuchadnezzar leaped to his feet in amazement and asked his advisers, "Weren't there three men that we tied up and threw into the fire?"

They replied, "Certainly, Your Majesty."

<sup>25</sup> He said, "Look! I see four men walking around in the fire, unbound and unharmed, and the fourth looks like a son of the gods."

<sup>26</sup> Nebuchadnezzar then approached the opening of the blazing furnace and shouted, "Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, servants of the Most High God, come out! Come here!"

So Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego came out of the fire, <sup>27</sup> and the satraps, prefects, governors and royal advisers crowded around them. They saw that the fire had not harmed their bodies, nor was a hair of their heads singed; their robes were not scorched, and there was no smell of fire on them.

<sup>28</sup> Then Nebuchadnezzar said, "Praise be to the God of Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego, who has sent His angel and rescued His servants! They trusted in Him and defied the king's command and were willing to give up their lives rather than serve or worship any god except their own God.

P: The word of the Lord.

C: Thanks be to God!

## Reformation Sequence Part 2

P: A major focus of Luther's Ninety-Five Theses was his concerns about the marketing of indulgences or letters of pardon for sins committed that were sold by traveling salesmen sent out by the church to raise funds for cathedral construction and other church projects. This money-raising strategy turned the forgiveness God gives freely through Jesus Christ into a commodity that could be purchased for the right price. Indulgences were readily available to wealthy people but not to the masses of common people—the kind of people that Luther knew well and preached to week by week. In Theses 36 and 37, he rightly asserts that God's forgiveness is equally available to all who repent.

C: "Every truly repentant Christian has plenary [full] remission of penalty and guilt, even without letters of pardon. Every true Christian, whether living or dead, has a part in all the benefits of Christ and the church, given him by God, even without letters of pardon."

P: Luther's love for the truth and his desire to bring it to light led to dark times for those who saw the light of the Gospel in the writings of the great reformer. In the second stanza of "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word," Luther prays that God would defend and protect the church and its people. His prayer in his day is our prayer today as well.

Gospel Acclamation Luke 12:32

C: Glory to You, O Lord.

<sup>5</sup> Jesus said to them: "Watch out that no one deceives you. <sup>6</sup> Many will come in My name, claiming, 'I am He,' and will deceive many. <sup>7</sup> When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. <sup>8</sup> Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be earthquakes in various places, and famines. These are the beginning of birth pains.

<sup>9</sup> "You must be on your guard. You will be handed over to the local councils and flogged in the synagogues. On account of Me you will stand before governors and kings as witnesses to them. <sup>10</sup> And the gospel must first be preached to all nations. <sup>11</sup> Whenever you are arrested and brought to trial, do not worry beforehand about what to say. Just say whatever is given you at the time, for it is not you speaking, but the Holy Spirit.

P: The Gospel of the Lord.

C: Praise to You, O Christ!

The Sermon

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

P: Lead us not into temptation, O Lord, but help us by Your Spirit to subdue our flesh, to turn from the world and its ways, and to overcome the devil with all his wiles. Lord, in Your mercy,

P: And lastly, O heavenly Father, deliver us from all evil of both body and soul, now and forever. Lord, in Your mercy,

C: hear our prayer.

P: We trust, O Lord, in Your great mercy to hear and answer us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

## <u>Reformation Sequence</u> Part 3

P: In the final two of the Ninety-Five Theses, Martin Luther gave an indication that he was well aware of the pathway that Christians would be taking as they followed the truth of the Gospel. No matter how contentious and challenging the world might be in a given era, the gracious guidance of Christ would be sufficient to lead His faithful flock to the joys of everlasting glory. Let's read together Theses 94 and 95.

C: "Christians should be exhorted to be diligent in following Christ, their Head, through penalties, death and hell. And thus be confident of entering into heaven through many tribulations rather than through the false security of peace (Acts 14:22)."

P: In Thesis 62, Luther shared the heart of his message in a most straightforward way, as he writes, "The true treasure of the Church is the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God." The closing stanza of "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Your Word" is a prayer for peace and unity to the Holy Spirit. With the psalmist we say to our loving Lord, "I will praise You with an upright heart. . . . I will keep Your statutes." (119:7a, 8a)

## A Reformation Benediction (From Luther's writings)

P: Let the Word of God be ever in your heart, on your lips, and in your ears. It always awakens new understanding, pleasure and devotion and purifies the heart and thoughts. When people cling to the Word in this way, our Lord and Savior and the entire heavenly host smile. This is most certainly true!

C: Amen.

P: The Lord bless you and keep you.

#### STEWARDSHIP ON "BEAUTIFUL TRUTH" IN NOVEMBER

Ever since the fall into sin, the concept of truth has been up for grabs. Our first parents believed the tempter's deceit and, in the aftermath, asserted their own truth in vain self-defense. Pilate, when invited to consider the truth of God, questioned whether truth existed at all. Paul testified to the Gentile world's denial of truth as they exchanged the glory of the immortal God for mere images.

Human beings today are no different. Fine print hides the truth. Political leaders stretch the truth. Individuals deceive themselves and call it truth. We follow the same pattern, pursuing a semblance of truth when convenient and reshaping it altogether when we think it necessary. Truth remains confused.

Into this mess of ugly comes biblical truth.

A series focused on truth could go in many directions—from an in-depth look at the nature of scriptural truth (certain, real, objective, eternal, etc.) to a study of how God communicates his truth (natural and revealed). Yet above all else, *biblical truth is CHRISTIAN truth*. It is truth centered in Jesus Christ. It is truth revealed through Jesus Christ. It's not merely a set of assertions or propositions to grasp with our minds, but a person to know with our hearts.

And as we come to know Jesus, we recognize that Christian truth is truly *beautiful*—for ourselves and for others. This series explores the beauty of Christian truth, along with the importance of deeply grasping it for ourselves and communicating it to others, especially the next generation. The series follows this approach:

- 1. <u>Steward the Truth as the Greatest Good</u>: God's truth is genuinely good—the *greatest* good. Believe it! (November 3, 2024)
- 2. <u>Steward the Truth as Shared Humanity</u>: Christian truth speaks to all people across time and distance. Share it! (November 10, 2024)
- 3. <u>Steward the Truth as Freedom from Deception</u>: The deception of sin hurts and enslaves. Christ's truth brings freedom and life. Declare it! (November 17, 2024)
